# Minutes of Annual General Meeting Held at Victorian Croquet Centre on 12<sup>th</sup> June 2012

- 1. Opening: The President opened the meeting at 11.15 am
- 2. Present:

- 4. Minutes of the Previous Annual General Meeting held 10<sup>th</sup> June 2010:

  - **4.2. Business Arising from the Minutes of the Previous AGM:** The Secretary advised that, despite requests, the then State Director of Coaching had not rewritten his part of the Annual Report (Item 5.1 of the Minutes refers).
- 5. Reports.
  - 5.1. Annual Report 2011-12.
    - **5.1.1.** It was moved and seconded that the AC Selection Committee part of the Annual Report not be accepted in its present form. An amendment was moved and seconded that the words "a somewhat disingenuous" be replaced with "an". The amendment was carried, became the motion, was put and carried.
    - **5.1.2.** It was resolved that the Annual Report be amended by withdrawing the Coaching Committee Report as inappropriate for inclusion.
    - **5.1.3.** It was resolved to accept the Annual Report 2011-12, subject to the above amendments. Secretarial Comment: Annual Report amended.
  - **5.2. Financial Report 2011-12.** Treasurer presented his report and spoke to the Audited Accounts, attached at Annex A. Resolved that the Financial Report 2011-12 be accepted.
  - **5.3. Annual Statement by Public Officer.** The Annual Statement by Public Officer was distributed to delegates. Resolved that the Annual Statement by Public Officer be received.

- **6. Adoption of Budget 2011-12.** The Treasurer presented his budget for 2012-13. Resolved that the budget be adopted. David Ross then addressed the meeting, reflecting on his time as Treasurer. The text of his address is attached at Annex B.
- 7. Setting of Fees 2012-13. Resolved that the Croquet Victoria Affiliation Fees for 2012-13 be set at \$50 per member, being \$21.50 ACA element (an increase of \$1.50 per member) and \$28.50 VCA element (an increase of \$1.50 per member).
- **8.** Appointment of Auditor 2012-13. Resolved that Ross Buchanan Pty Ltd be appointed as Auditor for 2012-13.
- 9. Election of Committee Members. The President stated that all voting for committee members would be by secret ballot and appointed Bill Keddie (Newstead) and Margaret Crowder (Frankston) as scrutineers, in accordance with Croquet Victoria By Law 5.3 Resolved by secret ballot, in accordance with Rule 21.3(e) and By Law 5, that the following nominations be accepted and that the nominees be appointed as:

Vice-President: Kenn Boal (Rich River)
Secretary: Jim Clement (Sarsfield)
Treasurer: Patrick Moore (MCC)

Members: Jim Saunders (Drysdale) for two years and Graeme Gallus

(Wodonga) for one year.

9.1. Further Vacancy. The President advised that the 5<sup>th</sup> June 2012 resignation of Snow Evans from Committee of Management had created a vacancy for which nominations could not be called in advance and called for nomination from the floor. Nominations were received for Hamish Menzies (Warragul), Adrian Masterman-Smith (Williamstown) and Graham Howie (Bairnsdale). It was resolved by secret ballot, in accordance with Rule 21.3(e) and By Law 5, that Graham Howie be elected as an Ordinary Member of Committee, for a period of two years.

The president thanked David Ross, the retiring Treasurer, and welcomed Patrick Moore and Graham Howie to the Committee.

- **10. Nomination for Life Membership.** The nomination of Valerie Haseloff for Life Membership having been submitted by Eastern Metropolitan CA in accordance with Rule 7.5(a), a secret ballot was held as prescribed by Rule 7.5(b). Resolved to appoint Valerie Haseloff as a Life Member of the Victorian Croquet Association Inc.

#### Victorian Croquet Association Incorporated Notes to the financial statements - 31 March 2012

#### 1. Summary of significant accounting policies

#### (a) Basis of preparation

This general purpose financial report has been prepared in accordance with the Associations Incorporations Act 1981 (Vic), Australian Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations, and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board.

The financial report was authorised for issue on behalf of the Association by Mr David Ross, Treasurer, on 15 May 2012.

Accounting policies are selected and applied in a manner that ensures that the resulting financial information satisfies the concepts of relevance and reliability, thereby ensuring that the substance of the underlying transactions or other events is reported.

The accrual basis of accounting has been used with revenues and expenses being recognised as they are earned or incurred, and are brought to account in the period to which they relate.

#### (b) Investments

Investments held are initially recognised at cost, which includes their transaction cost. They are subsequently measured at their fair value which is the equivalent to their market bid price at the end of the reporting period.

#### (c) Property, Plant and Equipment

Land and buildings are shown at cost, depreciation is not calculated on buildings.

Property & Equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is charged using the diminishing method, at rates considered appropriate to allocate the relevant cost or carrying value of each asset in full over the term of their estimated useful life.

#### (d) Taxation

Income tax is not accounted for as the Association is exempt from paying tax pursuant to section 50 (5) of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

#### (e) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and cash at bank, deposits at call with an original maturity of three months or less, which are held for the purpose of meeting short term commitments rather than for investment purposes, and which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

#### (f) Trade receivables

Trade receivables are recognised initially at fair value, then carry at amortise cost.

Collectability of trade receivables is reviewed on an ongoing basis. Debts which are uncollectible are written off.

#### Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable. Revenue is recognised for the major business activities as follows:

#### **Government grants**

Grants from the government are recognised at their fair value where there is a reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and the Association will comply with all the attached conditions.

#### Other revenue

Revenue from other sources is recognised on an accruals basis when the right to receive the income is established.

#### (g) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the taxation authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from or payable to the taxation authority is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

#### (h) Comparatives

Where necessary the figures for the previous year have been reclassified to facilitate comparison.

#### (i) Impairment of Assets

Assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the higher of replacement value and value in use.

The committee's responsibilities also include designing, implementing and maintaining internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies; and making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

#### **REFLECTIONS - JUNE 2012**

About ten years ago VCA was in a situation where there were urgent renovations and maintenance required at the VCA's Brighton North Headquarters 'Warleigh'. The clubhouse need major maintenance, fencing required replacement and the kitchen had been condemned. The yearly income from member affiliations was \$26,394 and together with government grants of \$25,000, there was a yearly 'profit' of approx. \$2,400.

VCA was 'asset rich' but very 'cash poor' and could not fund the above needs.

After a lengthy investigation, it was decided to move to a new 'VicUrban' estate at Cairnlea (formerly the Commonwealth Explosives facility), near the junction of the Western Ring Road and Ballarat Road. This site is readily accessible by freeways from the north, south, east and west, has train access nearby at Ginifer station and is twenty minutes away from Melbourne Airport Tullamarine. Ample carparking is available on site as well as street parking.

An international twelve court complex with an appropriate clubhouse / function centre was achieved, together with a substantial sum (\$3 million) invested.

A Business Plan:

- projected a shortfall from affiliations, etc. of \$120,000 per annum (\$50,000 for a full/time VCA Administration Officer and \$70,000 for maintaining the buildings and grounds);
- invested \$3 million (which was to maintain its value for perpetuity) and the increase in portfolio value or the yearly interest and dividends used to underwrite the shortfall.

VCA took possession of the new headquarters in June 2007 with Sandra Kastanaras appointed as the VCA Administration Officer, in November. James Hood was appointed as the greenkeeper on a yearly contract. These have proven to be inspired choices.

Sandra, knowing nothing about croquet but with exemplary office skills and financial acumen, is now known as the first point of contact from right around the state (and beyond) as she has gained a detailed knowledge of the croquet world, as well as personal connections to many through her friendly, patient manner. Knowing intimately the local area, she has established excellent relationships with Brimbank City Council and local tradesmen.

James, coming from a bowls' background has adapted to the differing requirements of the water saving grass 'Santa Ana'. The replacement of Courts 8/9/10 at the end of 2011 with 'Santa Ana' was achieved, above all expectations as to when they would be able to be brought into play. He has an intense personal interest in the VCC and takes great pride in having the courts and surrounds in the best possible condition.

The VCC is a headquarters of which we can justifiably be proud. It is still the aim to increase the yearly income and it is encouraging to have the Cairnlea Croquet Club recently reinvigorated with new members.

One aspect which should be acknowledged is that of the misinformation and expressed antipathy towards the VCA's relocation to Cairnlea. Right from the beginning of the move some derogatory comments were disseminated by a few, and it was only when individuals visited / played at the VCC did they understand the true situation. I am astonished that even today (June 2012) there are those who are unable to accept the decision made those ten years ago, and not see the reality of an excellent facility where national and international events are able to be enjoyed by all, and any individual, club or region wanting to play is made most welcome.

The substantial \$3million investment was never envisaged as a 'bottomless bucket' to hand out funds to clubs (despite misinformed rumours to the contrary). <u>Clubs</u> have the responsibility of maintaining their membership and playing facilities. These tasks vary across the state depending upon whether the local government leases the facilities, whether it is a joint facility with a bowl's club for example or whether the club owns the facilities. There is no 'one cap' fits everyone.

Recently we have learnt of the possibility of the State Government intervening in local government leases of sporting facilities. Presumably, this has something to do with the 'user pay' mantra. We should be aware that croquet must be the most inexpensive sport that individuals can chose to play – one item of equipment (the mallet), minimal yearly fees and the 'immovable' court fees of \$3/\$4/\$5 per day. When it was proposed that the court fees at the VCC should be \$10 per day (playing on court surfaces where a truly hit ball would keep its line and share with up to forty eight players at the one time with no double banking), the outcry must have been heard from Warrnambool to Orbost and from Mildura to Beechworth!!

Finally, I wish to express my appreciation for the privilege of serving in the position of treasurer over these past few years. To serve as a VCA Director on the Committee of Management or as a Regional representative brings an awareness of the commitment of volunteers from all around the state. Expertise and countless hours are given, to market and improve croquet throughout our state and beyond.

Long may "chess on grass" keep the grey matter active, the joints movable and the social interaction and competitiveness enjoyable.
